

Players, Parents, and Spectators

Code of Conduct

All players, parents, and spectators are expected to conduct themselves in a respectful and sportsmanlike manner at all times. In junior events, players are responsible for the behavior of their parents and spectators.

Any behavior deemed by tournament officials to be unsportsmanlike, disruptive, or disrespectful toward the hosting golf course staff, Jason Floyd Golf Academy (JFGA) team members, fellow competitors, the Triple A Tournament Series, or the golf course may result in disciplinary action. Such action may include a warning, penalty, disqualification of the player, and/or removal of the offending individual(s) from the premises.

Unsportsmanlike conduct includes but is not limited to: throwing or slamming clubs, damaging the golf course or facilities, failure to observe proper golf etiquette, abusive or offensive language, yelling, intimidation, deliberate miss-counting of shots, coaching or interference during play (unless permitted), or any behavior that misrepresents or brings discredit to the Jason Floyd Golf Academy, the Triple A Tournament Series or the host venue.

Tournament officials reserve the right to determine appropriate disciplinary action in the best interest of the competition and the spirit of the game.

By registering for a Triple A Series event, parents and guardians acknowledge their responsibility to uphold the Spirit of the Game and agree that breaches of this Code of Conduct & Safeguarding Policy by parents, guardians, or spectators may result in player penalties, including disqualification and dismissal from future Triple A Series Golf Events. In the event of any unresolved issues, parents should speak to the Triple A Series Directors in private at an agreed time, and not in front of children.

Parents/Spectators

All spectators must stay off fairways, tees and greens and walk 50 meters in front of the group that they are watching.

No signaling where to hit the ball is allowed. No approaching the ball after it has been hit. The player is allowed 3 minutes to look for his/her ball. Spectators can only help once the player is within range.

Spectators are not allowed to approach the ball and pick it up to identify the ball, this is for the player to do.
